I have just recently learned how to technical direct and hope to learn how to direct in the coming months. Another thing I want to try in the coming months is how to produce a show.

While I have not yet decided what I want my final career to be, I do know that I would like to work in a news organization, and either be a director, anchor, or producer. All three jobs interest me a lot. I am also open to potentially being a photojournalist because I have enjoyed my time behind the camera and presenting news in a purely visual format. I especially enjoy taking photos for broadcast stories because of the fast-paced nature and turnround time. I plan over the next two years to experiment in every aspect of the field that slightly interests me and then continue doing what I like and eventually I'll see where it leads me.


Since I am no longer pursuing a major in computer engineering, I will be losing my scholarship at the end of this year. If I was awarded the RTDNAC scholarship I would split up the money for three different things. The first thing is that I would purchase a SkillShare membership. I want to learn Adobe After Effects and Adobe Illustrator, and I feel that taking an online course this upcoming summer would be a great way to learn these two platforms. Once learned I can start completing projects for Elon News Network.

One of the things our organization is looking into changing is our broadcast graphics. We currently have graphics designed years ago and are looking to update them to increase our production value. Another example of when knowing the software would be useful is when we need additional graphics. This past month we decided one thing we could do to improve our production quality was to design a new COVID-19 wipe animation for when we broadcast COVID-19 news segments. It took one of our more experienced juniors a long time to figure out how to make one. I want to learn so that I can make them, and it will not take very long or require long phone calls with the previous alums first created them.

The second thing I would do with the scholarship is I would invest in a good zoom lens that is compatible with Canon cameras. At Elon University we have access to rent some media equipment, but it is tired based on experience, and I am not yet eligible to rent zoom lenses, nor will I be soon. I would like to invest in a good zoom lens that I can put on the provided camera bodies to help elevate the photos I

take. I think this lens would help me take more creative and detailed shots. For example, in sports I like shooting very close shots that are focused on the action and cannot quite achieve the look I want with the current gear I have access to.

Lastly, I would put the remaining money towards my tuition so that I can continue to take meaningful classes and complete my college degrees. In addition, my tuition helps pay for the amazing organizations and resources at Elon University, which I am especially grateful for because they have helped foster my love for journalism.
